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The Early Intervention Team

- Identify children at risk of serious youth violence and or exploitation using police and partner data.
- Share information and work with partner agencies.
- Identify gaps in provision.
- Global offer.
- Groups locations.

Overview

- East Street, Taunton and 3 adjoining areas in Bridgwater town centre were identified as the top hotspots for 'under 18's being a victim or offender of non-domestic violence' across Somerset
- Targeted problem-solving plans have been in place for these areas since Summer 2023 (July/August)
- Focus on reducing the impact of violence on children in the identified hotspots
- Primary objective was to reduce the frequency of violence involving under 18's in the hotspot areas
- Secondary objective was to reduce the harm* associated with under 18's violence in the hotspot areas

East Street, Taunton

Assessment

This area of Taunton, which includes East Street, has been identified as a persistent hotspot for youth violence within Avon and Somerset. Out of 143,000 hotspots, it has been ranked as the 7th most violent area in relation to youth violence. It is likely a problems-solving approach targeting this area will have a positive impact in reducing violent crime.

Key drivers of youth violence:

East Street is <u>located in</u> the Town Centre and is a busy location with many retail stores and food outlets. It is highly likely violence is being fuelled by existing tensions between local youths which may escalate into physical violence given the high chance of individuals meeting each other in the street.

McDonalds, located on East Street, is a popular location for young people to hang out. It is likely groups congregating at this location is a contributing factor towards violence and possible that anti-social behaviour is leading to heightened tensions which results in the use of violence.

This area of Taunton is currently patrolled under Op Habit. The existing pulse patrols are unlikely to be having a positive impact on youth violence with both crime count and crime harm increasing. An alternative problem-solving approach is therefore needed in this area.

- > 7th highest area for violence involving children
- Predominately female, 14-16years
- Saturdays, 1300-2300
- Limited repeat offenders at location
- Commonly known for drugs/ASB
- Offenders at McDonalds linked to Misper reports
- Majority involve groups and victim/offender are known to each other
- Existing tensions
- McDonalds ASB
- Sporadic, unplanned, not involving weapons

Initial Analysis

- All areas within the top 11 for violence involving for children
- High Street, Cornhill, St Mary Street, Fore Street

Throughout week 1600-1800 and 1900-0000

Predominantly Male, 14-17

74% of offenders linked to same network

Majority involve Groups and victim/offenders known to each other

Altercations with intoxicated adults - ASB - Large scale disorders - existing tensions

Eastover

Saturdays 2200-0100 and 1600-1800

Predominantly male - aged 13-14 - 74% of offenders linked to the same network

Majority Involve Groups

39% previously known to each other

Existing tensions - ASB - Unprovoked attacks - 24% involve alcohol - Sporadic - unplanned



Youth Survey

- Over 1200 Surveys completed by children and young people
- Only 10% had been a victim or offender
- Only 18% had reported the incident to police
- Concerned re threats posed by adults as much as other children
- Want more information about what to do if see or are involved in a violent incident
- Feel this should be in schools
- Police Teachers Parents should be sharing this information
- CCTV Street Lighting Community Guardians Supervised spaces




- Violent crime involving under 18's for the 2023/24 period fell to below the 5-year average and is the lowest since 2020/21 (when there were lockdowns in the UK).
- The hotspots with a decrease in crime were also subject to regular patrols under Op HABIT.
- McDonalds is only linked to one offence compared to the average of 5.
- Despite overall reduction in violent offences, there was a slight increase in overall harm.
- All hotspots saw a decrease apart High St/St Marys St, Bridgwater which saw an increase which drove overall increase in harm.


- 12% reduction in the number of offences in 2023/24, across the areas compared to the previous two years.
- Harm associated with violent crime was reduced by around a third when compared to the previous two years.
- Taunton hotspot saw the greatest reduction in youth violence, both in terms of crime count and crime harm.
- Offending at/outside McDonalds remained low, despite it being a problematic location in previous years.
- The Bridgwater hotspots all saw small increases in offending (1-3 crimes)
- The number of children involved in violence across the hotspots were reduced by 25% in 2023/24 compared to previous years.
- Fewer children involved in violence in Taunton, whereas in Bridgwater it remained broadly the same.
- Across the wider beat areas, the number of children involved in violence remained broadly the same.



Data as of November 2024 Crime Count

*The period under review is August 2023 to October 2024 (15 months). The data has been split into three-month blocks and has been compared to figures for the previous 15 months

- Violent crime affecting under 18's has decreased by 59% in the Taunton hotspot.
- Bridgwater hotspots have seen a 44% increase.
- Across three hotspots in the control area, where there was no targeted intervention, violent crime affecting under 18's increased by 30%.
- In the Avon and Somerset Force area, violent crime affecting under 18's increased by 12%.
- In Taunton, all violent crime has gone up by 13%, whereas violent crime affecting under 18's has decreased.



Crime Harm

The average harm score (per offence) in the Taunton hotspot has decreased by 56%. This reflects an overall decrease in harm of 81%.

The average harm score (per offence) and the overall harm score for the Bridgwater Hotspots has increased by 65%.

The harm associated with violence involving U18's across the force has also decreased by 15%.

Days with a violent crime

Taunton hotspot - fewer days in which a violent crime took place - decreased from 5% to 2%.

Bridgwater Hotspots - More days with a violent crime - increased from 7% to 9%.

Control area, where there was no targeted intervention, had a 3% increase in the number of days with a violent crime.

Numbers of Children

- Reduction in the number of children linked to violence in the Taunton hotspot.
- Increase in the number of children linked to violence in the Bridgwater hotspot. 17% of those involved were linked to violence offences before and after problem-solving began.

Crime Displacement

- 69% reduction in violent crime affecting under 18's, in the 100m surrounding the Taunton hotspot, suggesting crime was not displaced.
- 200% increase in the areas surrounding the hotspot in Bridgwater.

Conclusion

- Objectives of reducing violent crime affecting under 18's and the associated harm in Taunton area was met.
- Fewer children are becoming involved in violence in the area.
- No evidence to suggest that the crime was displaced.
- Increases in both volume and harm in Bridgwater.
- It is possible that a small group of persistent offenders are driving violence involving u18's in the Bridgwater area.
- There has been positive feedback from partners and the community.
- Work Highlighted by HMICFRS.

Learning

- Need for clearly defined location/focus.
- Need for early engagement of partners.
- Communicating work to partners is more challenging than you know.

Moving forward

Continuance of Hotpot Patrols.

Developed resources for schools, leaflets and website to remain.

Learning shared and being adopted elsewhere.

Highlight Youth Hubs will continue and expand across Somerset to East Somerset. Partners and Services are invited to join us.
