




# Demographics and disproportionality

- 198 children started an intervention programme with Somerset YJT in 24/25, with 78 starting a statutory programme
- The next slides look at:
  - Age
  - Gender
  - Ethnicity
  - Special education needs & disability (SEND)
  - Children's Risks of child exploitation


# Age

 34% children starting intervention programmes last year were aged 10-14




## Gender


- 20% of children starting programmes in 24/25 are girls (19% for statutory programmes)
- This is higher than seen nationally



## SEND


- The majority of children working with Somerset YJT have identified SEND, and a third have an EHCP in place
- Children with SEND are overrepresented in the national Youth Justice System.





## **CSC** involvement

- 57% children were involved with CSC or Early Help at the start of their most recent programme in 24/25
- This increases to 59% for children starting statutory programmes

# **Education as part of SYJS**

Under United Nations legislation, all children are entitled to an education; under Section 7 of the 1996 Education Act, it is the legal responsibility of parents to ensure that their children receive provision suitable to their age and aptitude (through enrolment at a school or by elective home education).

In England, full-time education is generally defined as 25 hours per week for 39 weeks per school year.

# **Education as part of SYJS**

There are established links between low educational engagement and attainment and the risk of childhood offending.

Children and young people who are not engaged in education, training or employment are much more likely to offend or reoffend than those who are.

There is a legal obligation for local authorities to ensure that young people of statutory school age are in either school or another full-time education placement.

# **Education as part of SYJS**

### My role:


- To ensure that all young people of statutory school age known to the Youth Offending Team (and wider Prevention Service as necessary) are accessing appropriate, inclusive educational provisions.
- Challenge inappropriate educational arrangements with relevant education providers and represent the needs of individual young people with their educational establishment with a view to obtaining a more suitable education package. This may relate to attendance and suspension via other LA departments
- Provide education advice, support and training to professionals on issues relating to education, including Youth Justice Service staff, Prevention (FIS and PeXT) staff, Children's Social Care staff and anyone else....

## Rocket science

**Education** is the **most powerful tool** for **diverting** individuals away from the criminal justice system.

This is because education can improve cognitive and non-cognitive skills, leading to better outcomes for children and young people, such as reduced reoffending rates and increased educational attainment.

Furthermore, providing educational opportunities and support can help prevent children from becoming entangled in the criminal justice system in the first place.



Turnaround is a youth early intervention programme led by the Ministry of Justice which enables the Somerset Youth Justice team to intervene earlier and improve outcomes for children on the cusp of entering the youth justice system.

Turnaround takes referrals from police and other partners for children aged 10-17 who are:

- Noticed by agencies with enforcement powers for repeated involvement in anti-social behaviour (ASB);
- Are involved in anti-social behaviour who have received:
  - Community Protection Warning/Notice (CPW/N);
  - Acceptable Behaviour Contract (ABC);
  - Civil Order for ASB;
- In receipt of Community Protection Orders (CPO), Civil Order and/or Acceptable Behaviour Contract (ABC) for anti-social behaviour;
- Interviewed under caution following arrest, or subject to a criminal investigation attending a voluntary interview;
- subject to a No Further Action (NFA) decision (including Outcome 22); Subject to a Community Resolution (Outcome 8);
- receiving a first-time youth caution, not including a conditional caution; released under investigation (RUI) or subject to pre-charge bail (PCB);
- •discharged by a court; acquitted at court; and/or fined by a court.

Although there is no single path to youth offending, there are certain needs and vulnerabilities associated with a child having an increased likelihood of being in contact with the youth justice system or becoming involved in offending behaviour. These include:

- Mental health concerns
- Substance misuse
- Having experience of the care system
- Being a victim of crime/ abuse
- Unstable family setting
- School absence and exclusions
- Undiagnosed educational needs

Interventions aiming to prevent the child from future offending should match services to the child's assessed level of need.

They should be strengths based and address the range of needs holistically, rather than in isolation. Consideration should be given to the wider context which could create vulnerabilities including physical and social/emotional/mental health needs, family, school, peer, and community issues. Taking a whole family approach, interventions could meet the needs of siblings and parents/ carers as identified through assessment.
