

How We Facilitate Change

Our interactive learning environments allow participants to discover other people's lived experiences and so challenge their own preconceptions. They get a new lens to understand their everyday lives and interactions.



ENGAGE

We employ curiosity, games, vulnerability, lively videos & visuals to create spaces for unlearning and remaking. We help men & boys overcome defensiveness and discomfort to establish an individual and group identity in line with important and desired changes. They develop identities & values for themselves and we support them in allyship.

EDUCATE

Our interactive learning environments allow participants to discover other people's lived experiences and so challenge their own preconceptions. They get a new lens to understand their everyday lives and interactions

EXPLORE

Through our exercises, participants unpack power dynamics, biases, group and cultural norms that structure inequalities and ineffective cultures. Each individual will understand their own role in these dynamics

EQUIP

We teach frameworks for analysis, workshop pragmatic ways to approach specific everyday situations, and build skills for compassionate action

EMBED

Each ah-hah moment can be a crucial catalyst for change. But transformations come from habits and organisational practices.



How we help schools

STUDENT WORKSHOPS

We guide important conversations that allow boys to question the stereotypes and expectations they face. We give them the tools to choose who they want to be and the confidence to become an ally.

TEACHER TRAINING

Teachers and school staff explore masculine stereotypes, and the impacts on students. Together, we develop new approaches to working with young men and create whole school action plans.

SEMINARS

This is a starting point for conversations about masculinities for parents, educators and guardians. It provides guidance and valuable foundations for working with and raising young men and boys.

Toolkit for Teachers:

Providing a comprehensive toolkit to support teachers in implementing effective strategies for boys' emotional and educational growth.

Consultation for Embedding a Whole-School Approach:

Offering expert consultation to help schools integrate a holistic, whole-school approach to supporting boys, fostering an inclusive, supportive learning environment.

Monitoring & Evaluation (M&E) Data:

Collecting and analysing M&E data to assess the impact of our programs, ensuring that our interventions are effectively addressing boys' challenges and supporting staff.

Tailored Feedback for Schools Post-Workshops:

Providing schools with personalised feedback after workshops, focusing on boys' experiences, challenges, and the importance of safeguarding and wellbeing. This ensures schools can track progress and make improvements.

OUR SCHOOLS WORK



IN SOMERSET

Three schools in Somerset to deliver the whole school approach:

- Holyrood Academy in Chard
- Bishop Fox's School in Taunton
- St Dunstan's School Glastonbury

In total, we delivered 54 workshops and we worked with 345 boys across the 3 schools, covering Year 9 & Year 10.



WHY DOES IT MATTER?

This work supports boys' mental health and emotional wellbeing.

This work benefits all pupils - and the broader school community.

This work supports boys to make their own choices about who they want to be.



WHY DOES IT MATTER IN SOMERSET?

Men in Somerset have a lower life expectancy than women. Life expectancy in the county is 79.8 years for men and 84 years for women.

Men in Somerset are slightly more likely than women to experience unemployment.

Men in Somerset are much more likely to die by suicide than women - between 2005 and 2019, men accounted for 70% of the deaths by suicide in the area. In 2016-2018, the suicide rate for men in Somerset was significantly higher than the equivalent rate across England.



What the boys are saying

Issues that came up

- 1. What it means to be 'successful' and the pressure to earn lots of money in order to be seen as a success
- 2. Fear of being ridiculed by the peer group or seeming 'weird' or different
- 3. Feeling misunderstood by adults and therefore getting frustrated

School recommendations

We asked one of the schools:

'if you could give some advice to a school contemplating doing work on positive masculinities, what would you say to them?' This was their response:

"DO it - highlight of my year! Helps build relationships with students which makes unpicking behaviours more helpful to make big long lasting changes rather than just dealing with an incident in school. Helping create a generation of kind and caring young people that can spread the message."





HOW TO HAVE CONVERSATIONS WITH BOYS



- Talk to your boys
- Conversations don't have to look one way
- Normalise having struggles & seeking help
- Disrupt patriarchal norms
- Try to stay regulated
- Let them know they can come to you
- Feelings over thoughts
- Be curious
- Be empathetic
- Explore with them
- Make it fun!!!
