We are following the UN Women 2025 Theme:
UNITE to End Digital Violence against All Women and Girls

This year focuses on the growing threat of digital violence — from online harassment and stalking to image-based abuse. The campaign calls for awareness, action, and collective responsibility to end all forms of violence against women and girls.

One in three women experiences violence. It's a global human rights emergency that must stop.

As the world marks 30 years of the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action, the campaign reminds us that digital safety is essential to achieving gender equality.

The Girl in the River - The Price of Forgiveness Screening and Panel Discussion.

Join us online for a powerful documentary screening and discussion.

To mark the 16 Days of Activism Against gender-based violence, the Harmful Practices Operational Group for Hammersmith & Fulham, Kensington & Chelsea, and Westminster. invites you to an online screening of A Girl in the River: The Price of Forgiveness, followed by a thought-provoking panel discussion.

Nominated for the 2016 Academy Award® for Best Documentary Short, this 40-minute film tells the harrowing true story of Saba, a young woman from Pakistan's Punjab region who survives an attempted 'honour' killing by her own father and uncle after marrying for love.

After the screening, a panel of experts will explore the film's central themes, including so-called 'honour'-based abuse, justice, and gender equality, positioning this in the UK context.

This panel discussion brings together key professionals from across the multi-agency response to domestic abuse.

The conversation explores how effective partnership working can improve safety and outcomes for survivors and their children.

Panelists reflect on practical challenges, innovative approaches, and the importance of shared accountability in tackling high-risk cases and supporting behaviour change among perpetrators.

Housing Insecurity & the Benefit System: How Online Systems
Disadvantage Survivors of Domestic Abuse

This webinar explores the challenges and risks created by the digitalisation of the UK's benefits system - including Universal Credit (UC) and Housing Benefit (HB).

It will examine how limited or no access to the internet can disadvantage survivors of abuse, further deepening inequality and social exclusion.

The session will also highlight how perpetrators can exploit or manipulate the benefit system to maintain control and entrap survivors, and how these systemic barriers contribute to housing insecurity, homelessness, or prevent survivors from moving on from homelessness.







Thursday, 4th December Launches at 11am Virtual - Free

In Conversation: Hidden Harms of Patient Access within the NHS Featuring: Dr Vishal Bhavsar, NIHR Advanced Fellow and Consultant Psychiatrist, King's Women's Mental Health, KCL

The interview will explore how health tech can be misused as a tool of abuse and the impact on the NHS, healthcare professionals and survivors.

Dr Vishal Bhavsar will examine how perpetrators can exploit digital systems and health technologies to extend abuse, including coercing patients to share medical records, tracking appointments, and using health information to intimidate or control.

The discussion will focus on solutions; from improving awareness and training to strengthening digital safeguards and promoting consultation with survivors and specialist services to help the NHS better protect patients and staff from technology-facilitated abuse.

Monday, 8th December 12pm - 1pm Virtual Lunch & Learn Session - Free Housing response to supporting survivors of digital abuse

This year the theme for the 16 Days is "UNITE to End Digital Violence against All Women and Girls" focusing on one of the fastest-growing forms of abuse: digital violence against women and girls.

This year's campaign is also a reminder that digital safety is central to gender equality and invites everyone to play their role in stopping digital abuse. This theme aligns with the aims of the local Coordinated Community Response (CCR) to ending VAWG, which is a model that places partnership working at the core of our VAWG strategies.

This lunch and learn session hosted by Adela Lategan and Sonja Kapalay, will focus on the forms of tech facilitated domestic abuse, the impact and barriers, legislation and partnership working and advocacy.







Tuesday 9th December 6pm - 8.30pm In-person - Roundtable (London) Coercive and Controlling Behaviour in the Context of Criminal Justice

The Impact Project will be hosting a roundtable discussion for professionals to discuss Coercive and Controlling Behaviour (CCB) as a Domestic Abuse offence in the context of criminal justice.

As we know, CCB is incredibly commonplace in domestic abuse, though notoriously difficult to evidence and charge in the context of criminal justice. At this roundtable discussion, we will hear from each core partner of the Impact Project to understand the challenges, share best practice, and learn from one another to improve criminal justice outcomes for victim/survivors of Domestic Abuse.
